National Walkout Day, April 20

I sincerely come to my parent community to inform all of you of the facts that occurred this past Friday. As seen in the media over the last month-there have been two publicized National Walk outs. One was in March while we were on Spring break and one was this past Friday. The unfortunate and sad violence that has been occurring in schools across the nation is a very relevant and important issue to not only parents, but to all of our students as well. I know that the day Columbine occurred years ago I had to force myself in dropping my own son at his kindergarten class the next day; fearful, sad and confused at what used to be a safe and normal activity in a mom's life. I have never looked at school the same way---not as a principal and not as a mom. With this said, I want our community to know how highly AUHSD and our administration team view safety and security.

Several weeks ago I received several well-written, articulate and compassionate essays addressing the school shootings, most recently the Parkland shooting. I brought one of the students into my office, where she requested "A Call to Action," a show of respect and time dedicated to the victims. As parents and educators, I think the greatest thing we can teach is character, respect and to stand up for what we believe in. These students exhibited great care to all of these values.

I did not come to any decision lightly, trying to view all perspectives on this highly emotional and personal issue that our stakeholders (teachers, parents, students) are touched by. Tinker vs. Des Moines, set precedent and laws for schools to adhere to in relation to school demonstrations and walkouts. We as a school are to provide a safe place for such an activity.

I decided to allow this student representative to read a brief statement on the loud speaker during our morning announcements calling for an 18-minute walk out in the quad. Seventeen minutes for each victim and one extra minute for all others before and after the Parkland shooting. This was a completely optional choice for each student and was in no way encouraged. There was no announcement made by a school staff member. Very calmly, roughly 100 students gathered in the quad under the supervision of our administration, counseling, security, and teachers on conference who volunteered. There were some standing in silence, some with a pre-made sign, some tried to start a chant, and yes, some ran around disrespecting the entire purpose. The adults sent those students back to class. After the 18-minutes, I announced to return to class which all students complied. Thereafter, we continued on with our testing schedule and entire school day with no other issues arising. As a school we are here to teach the facts and content...parents we support you in taking it from there. If you are to have any other questions, please feel free to reach out.





Join us to hear Darrel Ferguson, a core member, staff and volunteer of the Surfrider Foundation, speak about how for over a decade the Surfrider Foundation as well as many other environmental organizations have become aware of the ubiquitous presence of plastic particles in the ocean and its inhabitants. Over 40 years ago we knew plastic was becoming a threat to marine life in the form of entanglement, but only recently have we become aware of its threat to marine life as something ingested. We now suspect that the greatest harm by plastic is the fact that it can make dead zones by blocking out sunlight to phytoplankton. What can we do to help?


Mr. Ferguson has lived in Orange County for over 45 years. He has a background in plumbing and construction. He has been a member of Surfrider Foundation since 2004. In 2009, he became a core volunteer and has since served in many positions on the executive committee of the Newport Beach Chapter. He is now part time staff and program coordinator and oversees the water quality program used in 4 Orange County high schools, organizes the youth program in the Newport Beach Watershed, hosts over 20 beach cleanups each year and helps facilitate the Rise above plastics program and Ocean Friendly Restaurants program. He helps with the city of Newport Beach and the Orange County Public Works in their trash and debris volunteer monitoring programs.
